

#### 1. Opening and welcome

**FIL President Einars Fogelis warmly welcomes** the participants of the Congress and **officially opens the 71st FIL Congress 2023.** He is pleased to be able to welcome the delegates personally.

He addressed special greetings to the **President of the Romanian Luge**, **Bobsleigh and Skeleton Federation**, **Sorina Ticu**.

**Sorina Ticu** welcomes the participants of the FIL Congress and is glad that the Romanian federation together with the FIL has the pleasure to host this congress.

President E. Fogelis warmly welcomes FIL Honorary President Josef Fendt and FIL Honorary Members Svein Romstad and Harald Steyrer.

He welcomes and congratulates the newly and re-elected presidents. Tomas Hasek (CZE), Gwenaelle Noury (FRA), Klavs Vasks (LAT), Sorina Ticu (ROU), as well as Secretary General Kristaps Maurins (LAT), to their new offices. He also welcomes the representatives of the applicants and event organizers, as well as representatives of the commissions.

#### Klaus Bonsack

Deceased on 05 March 2023 at the age of 81 Member of the FIL Hall of Fame, Olympic Champion 1968 (doubles), Olympic Silver medal 1964 (singles), Olympic Bronze medal 1968 (singles) and 1972 (doubles), WCh Gold medal 1967 (doubles), Vice President Technical Matters of the FIL 1989-1994, from 1990 on successful Head Coach of the Austrian National Team

Deceased on 04 May 2023 at the age of 88 He was the "father" of the artificial luge track in Königssee, German national coach from 1965-1995, technical delegate for the FIL for many years with consulting activities for new luge tracks, FIL Medal of Honor in Gold recipient

died on 15 May 2023, at the age of 80, honorary member of the FIL, first FIL Executive Director from 1993-2010, from 1978-1990 he was Secretary General of the Bobsleigh and Sledding Federation of the former GDR

#### 2. Role call and voting rights

**Secretary General D. Bell** welcomes the congress participants and checks the attendance. At the time of the opening of the congress, there are **33 members/NFs seated and with voting rights** in the meeting room.

The 71st FIL Congress (1st congress day on 17 June 2023) is attended by:

Nigeria is represented by delegates at the 71st FIL Congress and is the first African member country in the history of the FIL.

The 1st Delegate of Nigeria, Mr. Daniel Damola, addresses the FIL Congress briefly.

**President E. Fogelis and Secretary General D. Bell** present their reports to the Congress.

**President E. Fogelis** thanks **Secretary General D. Bell for** his report and gives the executive board the opportunity for additions.

#### 7. Discussion of the work reports

**President E. Fogelis** will give the executive board and members of Congress the opportunity to ask questions about the reports.

**Malgorzata Grzyb/IRL:** Is there anything the FIL is doing to attract girls to the sport that you can share with member federations to help attract more girls from other sports?

**President E. Fogelis:** The decision for the women's doubles was made a few years ago and we are now very happy with it. Besides, the popular sport is very important to attract new female but also male athletes.

**Secretary General D. Bell:** Gender Equality is a very high priority in the FIL and will be considered in all new endeavors.

Congress members had no further questions about the reports.

#### 8.1 Confirmation of the executive board resolution of September 23, 2022

**Secretary General D. Bell** informs the Congress that a simple majority is needed for the following resolution.

Resolution of the FIL executive board of 23 September 2022

The FIL Executive Board decides on the basis of paragraph 4.5.8 of the FIL Statutes: In view of the war of aggression currently being waged by the Russian Federation against Ukraine, the suspension of all rights to participation of athletes, assistants, coaches, and other officials of the Russian Luge Federation in FIL-sanctioned competitions is ordered until further notice in order to ensure safe, peaceful, and upright athletic competitions.

The presence of Russian athletes, assistants, coaches, and other officials from the Russian Luge Federation during the staging of FIL-sanctioned sport competitions is associated with the high risk that the safety, peacefulness and integrity of these competitions and their participants (including those of the Russian Federation itself) are gravely endangered. This risk is based on the causal personal involvement of the named persons in these FIL competitions and cannot be replaced by a less drastic

measure, so that the suspension of participation is proportionate if and as long as the hostilities in Ukraine continue as a reason for this measure.

#### A. Andreeva/RUS:

- The aim is to develop the sport of luge, to spread it and to promote it.
- The Russian Luge Federation has been suspended from luge events and must fulfill its obligations to maintain the sport of luge in Russia.
- Increase in the number of competitions in the general class, juniors, and youth A.
- Organization of competitions in Sochi, Moscow, and other regions of Russia.
- Broadcasting of the Russian championships to attract new and existing fans and increase their interest.
- Appeal to the congress to remember that sport is not politics! The FIL goals should be pursued together for the sake of our sport.

Secretary General D. Bell asks the congress if anyone would like to make a motion to have this executive board resolution ratified by the congress.

USA, seconded by GBR, makes the motion to have the congress approve the executive board resolution that was passed.

The congress is in favor of an open vote. Voting is by acclamation.

#### Congress resolution 03/23

Congress resolves that the executive board resolution of Sept. 23, 2022, be affirmed as written. (enclosure 3)

**Dr. Ch. Krähe** explains the following amendments to Congress:

Motion 1 (applicant FIL executive board)

Motion to amend the statutes with the following main points

- Specification of the purpose of the association
- Specify the material resources with which the FIL can generate revenue.
  - is necessary in order to be able to establish the urgently needed capital company (limited liability company) for the areas of marketing and events

**L. Bochette/PUR**: Different countries have diverse legal influences. Has the location already been chosen and what will happen next?

**Dr. Ch. Krähe** informs that it will be a company in Austria with the appropriate Austrian tax requirements to fulfill the non-profit status.

A 2/3 majority is required for the following resolution:

#### Congress resolution 04/23

The motion to amend the statutes in accordance with the proposal is approved. (enclosure 4)

#### Motion 2 (applicant FIL executive board)

FIL Code of Honor Regulations: Deletion of the title "Honorary Vice President"

Justification: Almost all sports federations only have the honorary president and the honorary member. The FIL would like to adapt here.

#### 8.3 General motions

**President E. Fogelis** leads the congress through the general motions from Czechia, New Zealand and Sweden. The Congress must vote on the motions.

#### Motion 1: applicant Czechia

#### **D. Rydl/CZE** presents the motion of CZE to the congress.

The supplier cannot be freely chosen, however the prices for sled parts have increased drastically. The cost of the sleds or at least some parts of them should be reduced.

**President E. Fogelis** agrees that something has to be changed in the implementation after 2026, but until then the cooperation with Kästle should remain.

→ CZE withdraws the motion.

Massimo Rinaldi/ITA wants to know how many manufacturers there are at the moment. President E. Fogelis: For women's doubles we currently have only one - Kästle. Technical Director A. Sics informs that for the 2026/2027 season standard sleds are being considered in the general class in all disciplines. Whether it will be standard sleds or only standard parts is not yet decided.

The goal is to make the sport cheaper and more affordable for everyone.

President E. Fogelis adds that the price, of course, also depends on the quantity.

#### Motion 2: applicant New Zealand

**G. Balme/NZL** presents the motion of NZL to the congress.

Participant grants for Continental Cup/Youth A to support the development of these classes; FIL costs remain unchanged.

He informs that the executive board agrees in principle with the motion, but the exact wording still has to be worked out.

→ NZL withdraws this motion.

#### Motion 3: applicant New Zealand

**G. Balme/NZL** presents the motion of NZL to the Congress.

Obtain a worldwide and global sponsor to work with member nations in their local markets.

Some organizational difficulties present themselves. This is a matter for the WG Marketing.

→ NZL withdraws this motion.

#### Motion 4: applicant New Zealand

**G. Balme/NZL** presents the motion of NZL to the Congress.

Establish a WG in the strategic plan to pursue increasing revenue with appropriate goals.

→ NZL withdraws this motion.

#### Motion 5: applicant New Zealand

**G. Balme/NZL** presents the motion of NZL to the Congress.

Beginning with the 2023 Congress, a consolidated report on progress in implementing the strategic plan should be provided.

The reports will be presented to the congress today and attached to the minutes.

→ NZL withdraws this motion.

#### Motion 6 + 7: applicant New Zealand

**G. Balme/NZL presents** the two motions of NZL to the congress.

AT+NT: Increase support for nations and athletes outside Europe, as costs are much higher for them, and most races are held in Europe.

The costs for the FIL for this would be enormous. This is not possible at the moment.

→ NZL withdraws this motion.

**J. Ahlberg/SWE** informs the congress that there are no further comments to add due to the presentation of D. Bell. The motions 8-11 from Sweden should only be seen more as ideas for support and improvement. The in-house production of livestreaming and FIL studio is going in the right direction and should be further developed.

#### Motion 8: applicant Sweden

Approval of foiled visors to gain more space for sponsors.

#### Motion 9: applicant Sweden

Improving the presentation of the sport - displaying athletes before the race, visualizing graphics while driving at speed, etc.

#### Motion 10: applicant Sweden

Implementation of live commentators at junior and youth A races

#### Motion 11: applicant Sweden

Improve camera positions e.g. with small cameras in the ice and fast switch cuts.

**Secretary General D. Bell** explains that The FIL executive board agrees in principle with all motions of SWE, that these things are also already included in the strategic plan and that work is already being done on the implementation.

→ SWE withdraws motions 8-11.

#### **Emergency motions of the executive board to the FIL Congress**

#### Emergency motion 1: applicant executive board

Mandatory anti-doping education prior to issuance of a FIL e-license (applies equally to artificial track and natural track) IRO §1, page 3

**Dr. Ch. Krähe** informs the Congress about this emergency motion.

Congress held a brief discussion on this emergency motion.

GBR notes that the deadline of "before the start of the season" should be removed from the motion.

A simple majority is required for the following resolution:

#### Congress resolution 07/23

The Congress approves the executive board's emergency motion for mandatory anti-doping education prior to the issuance of a FIL e-license. The deadline "before the start of the season" is deleted from the motion. (enclosure 7)

USA makes motion, seconded by AUS, to have the congress approve the emergency motion.

A simple majority is required for the following resolution:

The Congress approves the executive board's emergency motion on the homologation of luge tracks for Olympic Winter Games, FIL Championships and FIL competitions. (enclosure 8)

# 9.1 Approval of the annual statement of accounts (01 April 2022 – 31 March 2023)

**Vice President Ph. Trattner** informs the congress that he is stepping down from his position as VP Finance tomorrow due to his professional responsibilities.

He informs that the annual budget 2022/2023, which was taken over by H. Steyrer, could be kept by and large.

The following two budget areas will need to be considered in the future:

- Personnel costs in general (inflation is increasing and the areas of responsibility are becoming more and more and can no longer be managed on a voluntary basis)
- Rising costs for TV production (travel expenses, personnel costs, accommodation costs)

Costs in these areas were higher, but more revenue was generated. Congress participants will have the opportunity to ask questions about the 2022/2023 financial statements.

GBR: Are the higher TV production costs one-time or will we have them again in 2023/2024? VP Ph. Trattner: We do not have these subsidies for the event organizers in 2023/2024 because the venues are limited in the coming season and TV production will be cheaper.

**VP Ph. Trattner** presents the current asset status of the FIL as of March 31, 2023 and also gives the congress the opportunity to ask questions about this. The members of the congress have no further questions about the assets.

**VP S. Buta:** The public must be made aware of the sport again. We need to combine professional sports with amateur sports to attract participants. The equipment must be similar to that used in competition. Natural track sport will continue to exist, this has tradition.

**M. Rinaldi/ITA:** Is there a deadline for the sponsor for natural track or does this remain open?

**VP S. Buta:** There is no deadline. Hopefully a sponsor will be found in cooperation with Th. Schwab and M. Prock.

**E. Warren/USA:** FIL Studio - What is needed to maximize market opportunities. For example, how high does the budget need to be so that the cost per viewer is still similarly low?

**GS D. Bell:** The cost per viewer is very low, that's true. We need to get people to watch luge again.

David Owen is our strategist and plans our budget for us and together with us. In the end, you have to try out what brings in the most.

**H. Ruetz/AUT:** There has to be a convergence between the top sport natural track and public sledding. Of course, it is difficult to increase the budget if there are no sponsors. However, the support of the FIL should not be lacking here. The item 4495 Social Media NT, which is still included in the annual financial statement 2022/2023, was completely deleted in the annual budget 2023/2024.

**VP Ph. Trattner:** It is true that the budget cost social media for natural track has been cut. A lump sum was incorporated for the upcoming season, in an area where natural track is currently operating. In the last budget estimate, sponsorship revenue was implemented, which should have covered TV production costs as well. Unfortunately, these deals never happened. Since the natural track also has low to no revenues, one cannot have great expectations for the level of expenditures. That's why the executive board made the decisions they did. It is necessary to work together to further develop and better market the natural track product.

**L. Moroder/ITA:** Bringing racing and popular sports together is the only way to bring people closer to sledding again. The sleds should look the same but the internal structure must be understandably different.

For marketing, the best product must be worked out together. In the meantime, however, there should be a financial basis for survival.

**VP Th. Schwab:** Agrees in principle with L. Moroder. The convergence of the popular sport with the professional sport is very important for the natural track as well as for artificial track. A total mixing of the popular sport and the top sport should not take place, the latter should still stand out. The marketing of natural track is very important and must be addressed, even if the search for sponsors will not be easy.

**President E. Fogelis** thanks the delegates for the important questions and comments and closes the 1st day of the congress.

## **2024 Congress Report**

## **Vice President of Sport, Artificial Track**

Dear Members of Congress,

Looking back at the past season, the FIL had two highlight races — the Youth Olympic Games in PyeongChang and the World Championships in Altenberg. The World Championships were successfully conducted and the event organization was commendable, with good spectator attendance on all days. In my work at the Youth Games, I was pleased to see we had increased the number of nations represented from 22, at the last edition in St. Moritz, to 26 nations this past January, and we remained consistent with representation across four continents. It was noted that the quality of athlete at our Youth A level still needs to be attended to by the National Federations, and our Youth Commission has taken this fact into consideration in their work and have reported on their concepts to improve this situation for the safety and growth or our young athletes. We look forward to the fifth awarding of the Youth Olympic Games in the near future.

Many thanks are extended to the event organizers, the national teams, and the FIL event staff for the successful completion of the season, especially under difficult weather conditions in the last half of the season. In the World Cup race series, all athletes and teams additionally had some big challenges with the calendar as there were repeat times when teams trained and raced on the same track for two weeks and, on the occasion of World Championships, for a lengthy three weeks with the ITW, the race itself, and a World Cup ensuing. The creation of the annual race calendar is always a huge challenge, last season especially so, however our Sport Director in conjunction with our fellow International Federation, IBSF, has been able to present a much-improved calendar for next season and a draft calendar for the following race period, already the Olympic season.

Our planning for the Milano/Cortina Olympic Games in 2026 is underway and will begin to intensify over the next season as we enter the qualification period. The qualification period is conducted, as always, over the two seasons prior to the Games. The system has been adapted to allow for the introduction of the Womens Doubles into the Olympic Games, which has been a well known challenge to integrate within our existing

overall quota of 106 athletes. Please refer to the FIL website for the details of the qualification process as approved by IOC.

We are aware that the new qualification system will potentially be a challenge for some nations for this edition of the Olympic Games. We all continue to work actively, especially our President and General Secretary, to increase our quota allocation going forward for the 2030 and 2034 Games, which will be jointly awarded this July. We remain hopeful; however we are acutely aware that there is no guarantee and we understand the challenges ahead of us if the quota remains at 106. It cannot be stressed enough that this limited quota could seriously impact the growth of gender equality and of the disciplines within our sport.

On a positive note, we were able to successfully conduct our testing of the new Team Relay format, which integrated the Women's Doubles into the team, throughout the season and at the World Championships. The increase of the overall team to six athletes was well received and safely conducted and will continue with regulations being added to update our rule book. With this, FIL has successfully laid the foundation for the gender equality goals that have been pursued over these recent years.

I was very happy to meet again with our Sports Commission this past April for the first time under the direction of our Sports Director, Matthias Böhmer, who follows in the footsteps of our very successful prior director, Maria-Luise Rainer. Our Sport and Technical Directors worked hard over the whole season to listen to teams, discuss together, and lead debates which have resulted in some innovative ideas that we will be working to implement into the next season and beyond. Only four motions, presented by two nations, were submitted for review, which speaks to a highly stable rule book. The Commission itself reviewed over 39 total motions, coming from these two nations, the Youth Commission, and the members themselves. Some of the motions were simply updates to reflect current actual practices, but there are some creative and major concepts presented with new formats that have been successfully tested and will mark another evolution in our sport. The Sports Commission has taken great strides toward fulfilling the planned goals of the Slide 2026 Strategy Plan as assigned by the outcome of the Sport Working Group and are delivering on one of the key pillars of the overall plan. We hope the Congress will work alongside the Commissions and approve the presented motions.

In one of my roles on the Board, I also continue to oversee the Development program in conjunction with our Development Director, Fred Zimny and with the very active support of our General Secretary, Mr. Dwight Bell who represents us at the Presidium. The programs continue to improve under Mr. Zimny's guidance, and he especially continues to work closely with new nations who are interested in implementing programs to launch the sport of luge in their respective countries but may lack in resources. I urge you all to read his report in detail and understand the work that is being done to develop our sport globally – again an aspect of the Slide 2026 Sport Strategy Plan directed by the Congress. Many thanks to all our FIL coaches for their efforts and their continued hard work in this area.

In closing, I would like to highlight the excellent work of our Sport Director, Matthias Böhmer, and our Technical Director, Andris Sics. Their hard work is recognized and supported by myself and the Executive Board, and I'm happy to be working with them through the remainder of this quadrennium. In our Youth and Juniors, I would also like to thank Hans Juergen Kohne and Maria Jasencakova. All these critical positions continue to ensure that our sport has a consistent high level of professionalism throughout the season at all of our events.

Many thanks to the representatives of each National Federation, the FIL Executive Board, the athletes, coaches, officials, event organizers, the numerous volunteers, our Executive Director, Christoph Schweiger, and the FIL office staff, for their ongoing support of my work and their tireless efforts on behalf of our sport. It is my pleasure to serve in this position.

# 72nd FIL Congress Congress Report Vice President Technical Matters Artificial Track

Dear Congress Participants,

In the past competition year, 9 World Cups, 6 Team Relay World Cups, 3 Sprint World Cups, the Continental Championships and the highlight of the season, the World Championships in Altenberg, were held in the general class.

The several double WC events did not exactly meet with positive feedback from all nations. Starting the racing season overseas can be seen as positive.

The last third of the WC season and the resulting results were heavily influenced by constantly changing weather conditions. By changing the starting order, it was possible to ensure a relatively fair competition for all concerned.

A new race format was tested at the WC final: The 2 competition runs of the singles competitions were held on 2 consecutive days for the first time. However, the feedback was divided.

For their part, the juniors contested 6 WC races, the Continental Championships and the highlight of the season, the Junior World Championships in Lillehammer.

Youth A was divided into two categories. Five races were held on European tracks and four races in North America and Asia, which also counted towards qualification for the Youth Olympics.

The Youth Olympic Games - YOG in South Korea can undoubtedly be described as the highlight of the season. Exciting, fair, and accident-free competitions were the ultimate advertisement for international luge.

In the past season, no major accidents were reported and only 3 disqualifications were issued. This is certainly due to good preparation and consistent compliance with IRO regulations on the part of all nations. The measures taken in recent years regarding safety on the tracks and sleds also contributed to this.

A new training and racing shoe with integrated ankle protection was further developed and the test phase was successfully completed. The feedback from the athletes was extremely positive in this regard and this new model will therefore be freely available from the upcoming racing season.

The technology working group has worked intensively on standard dimensions for bridges, boxes and runners and defined these. These are to be used from 2026. The company Wimmer was commissioned to develop standard runners.

The University of Bayreuth was commissioned to develop solutions in terms of additional weight. In addition, the weight checks are to be digitalized.

The topic of neck protection was also discussed. Cooperation with the Medical Commission is certainly required here.

To maintain the positive image of the sport of luge, we need to continue to work together as we have done so far. I would therefore like to thank everyone; athletes, coaches, technical staff, judges, experts, referees, commissions, organizers, national associations for their commitment.

Special thanks also go to the Medical Commission, which monitors the strict requirements and compliance with WADA regulations, the Anti-Doping Code and the Anti-Doping Principles during the season.

I would also like to thank the Technical Director Andris Sics, the Sport Director Matthias Böhmer and the team at the FIL office for their helpful and competent support.

I will present the last season in a few words.

Due to the any changes and the aftermath of the decision not to apply for the Olympics, there was a sense of resignation after the great uncertainty and demotivation of recent years. Getting this situation under control again, restoring motivation and getting people back on the right way was a great challenge that took a lotationergy.

The effort this winter was once again enormous, and the warm winter meant that there were postponements and program changes again.

To summarize, I would like to say that it is important that the World Cup races have a live broadcast!

Unfortunately, we missed the short clips with the highlights of the day this year, which we no iced particularly in the social media area. The media presence of the events must be increased in order to better showcase our sport.

I was also very pleased that nations such as Switzerland, Finland, Slovenia, Slovakia, Croatia etc. made it into the top 10 at the events.

Technically, he races worked very well, the cooperation between the individual areas, TD, jury, timekeeping, TV, livestream, social media, press, photos, advertising c oordinator etc. was once again commendable. A TEAM has now developed that sticks together and works in a solution-oriented manner! Thank you all for your good and collegial cooperation!

The past sea on was accompanied by a lot of effort, planning uncertainty and bureaucracy, looking back we can all be proud of ourselves, we have "rocked the natural track' despite all the difficulties.

Now let's talk about the future.

At the Bucharest congress we discussed public sledding, the new concept that will bring our sport closer to the public and more visible.

Since then have taken concrete steps. At this moment we have three prototypes of sleds that work on ice and snow. They were tested by athletes last season on ice and snow and they worked well.

In the next se ason, we propose the purchase of 10 sleds with the support of Fill and the organization of the first two test competitions in Switzerland and Norway on the snow slopes. Depending on the results, we will move on and in the following years we will propose IRQ regulations, mixed sled competitions on natural trac s in traditional and public sledding. We are also thinking about summer roll r competitions.

We designed these programs to make sport more attractive and accessible to the population.

I also assure you that I will never agree with giving up the traditional sport of sledding on natural tracks.

#### **Report VP Marketing**

April 2024

#### **Foreword**

The FIL can look back on a successful 2023/24 season. All competitions took place in a well-organized and professional setting. Once again, a big thank you to all the organizers and the many volunteers who made this possible.

The highlight of the past season was the World Championships in Altenberg. Well in advance of the World Championships, the Altenberg organizers implemented construction measures that could not have been financed without the awarding of these championships. The FIL's competition awards therefore always help to ensure that our sports facilities can be modernized accordingly. In Altenberg, for example, the infrastructure in the finish area (athletes' area buildings) was significantly expanded for these World Championships, which has considerably improved the quality of the competition for our athletes.

The races on the very difficult Altenberg track were hard to beat in terms of excitement. This was impressively confirmed by the good TV ratings and the large number of spectators.

#### 1. Implementation of the Marketing Concept

The second year of implementation of the new FIL marketing concept was much smoother than last year. In particular, the event organizers and their partners were able to benefit from the newly created third area under ice advertising. The cooperation between the agencies and the event organizers went just as smoothly.

The presentation of our sponsors was implemented excellently by RGS. The presentations at the start and finish areas were the most effective. There is still potential for optimization in the track area, where even more visibility could be achieved in future with illuminated advertising elements.

#### 2. Event Organizers/Events

Cooperation with our event organizers is at a very high level. Almost all World Cup events are accompanied by attractive supporting programs and very appealing hospitality programs. The events in Igls, Oberhof, Winterberg, Altenberg, Sigulda and Lake Placid deserve special mention. Some of the FIL sponsors and their agencies were present at these events. This also benefits the agencies, who were able to expand their networks together with our sponsors/partners.

Unfortunately, we have not yet achieved a noticeably better situation for our spectators and fans in the event sector. Our races are still too lengthy for spectators. This is primarily due to our competition formats, which drag on far too long. To really take a step forward here, we need to reform our sport.

#### 3. TV Production

In the last two years, TV production prices have risen by an average of 25 to 30%. At the same time, there is a demand to raise the quality of productions through new and innovative technology. As TV production is not the only cost increase in our field of work, both the FIL and the BSD, which is responsible for German TV production, feel compelled to reduce costs by cutting production costs. At an initial workshop with our new TV coordinator Vera Bichler, we tried to replace staff-operated cameras with fixed cameras in order to save costs and to optimize the images in TV production by changing the camera schedules. Vera Bichler will be directing most of the productions, which will ensure greater continuity and quality in our TV productions.

The FIL and the BSD would like to take this opportunity to thank the outgoing TV coordinator Britta Semmler for the many years of trusting and very professional cooperation. We wish her every success in her future professional projects.

#### 4. FIL Studio / Streaming


With the launch of its own FIL YouTube channel (FIL Studio), the FIL has taken another important step towards expanding its digital media presence. Combining the FIL Studio and live streaming made it easier for fans to access our sport. However, as the merging of the channels meant that there could be no breaks, the amount of work required to fill the program was enormous and almost impossible to manage. We would like to take this opportunity to thank Kate Hansen for her tireless commitment. Despite the huge amount of work involved, we are still not reaching enough of our viewers and fans with the FIL Studio. To improve the situation, more pre-produced material should be used in the FIL Studio in future. This would also reduce the amount of work for Kate Hansen on location. It would also be necessary to produce in German so that the content would be more usable for these nations as well.

#### 5. Media Analysis Marketing Figures

The FIL, together with the BSD, has commissioned a study to evaluate the media data of its sponsors. The analysis of the figures shows that the advertising value for our partners is in very good proportion to our revenues.








The chart shows that there was a clear disparity in viewer interest between the broadcast times in Europe and North America. The World Cups in Germany and Latvia show high coverage. The FIL's premium product was the WCh in Altenberg.




Eberspächer's visibility has decreased slightly compared to the previous season. Nevertheless, the advertising values are far above expectations. The space on the start number has the desired effect for Eberspächer.



The same can be observed at BMW. Here, too, visibility has decreased slightly compared to the previous season. The presentations in the target area are having the desired effect.



As with the other sponsors, visibility decreased slightly compared to the previous season. The distribution of visibility on our advertising media is relatively evenly distributed at Hargassner.



The performance of Skechers, which has the smallest advertising package of the FIL, appears to be more than satisfactory with these results. Here, too, a relatively uniform presence on our advertising media can be observed.

Compared to the previous season, there has been a decrease in TV times of around 5 hours. This figure is always very much related to the geographical and temporal distribution of the World Championships and the highlights of winter sports as a whole. However, the media analysis also shows that viewer

interest is significantly higher in the second half of the season than in the previous season. This is therefore our own approach to further optimizing the results.

In the final analysis, the FIL has succeeded in significantly improving its media presence in the last two years compared to the previous Olympic cycle. The figures clearly show that the FIL and its partners have benefited from the change in the marketing system through the change in visibility (division of partners into focus zones). If this trend continues, the market value of our sports is likely to have increased by around 20% compared to previous years.

#### 6. Further strategic approach to marketing

Due to the good TV ratings from last season, it would be sensible for the FIL, as well as for the agencies working with us, to hold initial contract talks with our partners for the period 2026 to 2030 ahead of time. The FIL's current contracts also allow for this, as most contracts are structured with a right of first negotiation without an option. For compliance reasons, these negotiations should not be conducted by the FIL alone, but in cooperation with our consulting agency TheRiA.

#### 7. Natural Track

Unfortunately, it was not possible to find a new partner to financially support the natural track competitions last season. Nevertheless, thanks to the division's strong commitment - together with producers Martin Böckle and Martin Reifer - it was possible to produce a streaming program that could almost be refinanced by broadcasting on Red Bull and Servus TV.

Natural track is not easy to market due to its limited TV presence. A reform process is currently underway in the sport that will see natural track luge develop more in the direction of popular sport. If this succeeds, we see great potential for the sport to be marketed far better with tourism regions and branded sports products than is currently the case. Until this transition is successful, it would be conceivable to market the sport in connection with artificial track advertising surfaces.

## Report from Vice President of Asia

# FIL Vice President of Asia Jay Jieun Park

I am pleased to provide you with a comprehensive update on the activities and developments within the Asia region pertaining to the sport of luge. This report outlines recent events, achievements, challenges, and initiatives in Asia.

#### 1. Competition events.

- Asian Championship (Ach), Youth A Continental Cup (Youth A): The Ach along with Youth A has been instrumental in promoting luge in the region and media. Competitions took place in PyeongChang Olympic Sliding Center, including South Korea, Japan, Taiwan, Thailand and Ukraine, attracting talented athletes from across Asia and beyond.
- 2024 Youth Winter Olympic in Gangwon (2024 YOG): Young athletes from all
  over the world have participated in one of the best sport competitions, Youth
  Winter Olympic, showcasing their skills and competitiveness on the global stage.
  Around 30 officials from Korea that KLF and OCOG have recruited have
  successfully played significant roles in 2024 YOG.

#### 2. Development Program.

- First FIL Luge School in Asia: Efforts to nurture young talent in luge continue through development programs organized by Korea Luge Federation (KLF), 2018 PyeongChang Legacy Foundation and supported by FIL. These initiatives focus on grassroots development, talent identification, and skill enhancement among youth athletes from Asia.
- International Judges: Training programs for officials have been conducted to

improve the quality of officiating standard roles to obtain their significant tasks, ensuring fair play and safety in luge competitions. Furthermore, now, KLF has more than enough international judges who can contribute to the success of any international luge events in Korea.

#### 3. Challenge and Opportunities

- Training Support Opportunities: The project, collaborated with 2018 PyeongChang Legacy Foundation, has been widely successful and recognized by FIL and media. After having to train with 2 of Thai luge beginners for the past 2 seasons, they both achieved their ways to the Youth Winter Olympic in Gangwon.
- Technical Support by FIL: Continued focus on technical development and innovation is essential to keep pace with advancements in luge equipment and techniques. Therefore, Asian luge needs greater supports by FIL, ensuring that Asian athletes can challenge in the international competitions at the high levels.
- Awareness and Promotion: While luge continues to slightly gain popularity in Asia, there remains a need for increased awareness and promotion of the sport to attract wider audiences and sponsors. Strengthening collaboration among Asian countries and federations will be the key to driving the growth of luge in the region. Initiatives such as joint training camps, exchange programs, and regional competitions can facilitate awareness and Promotion of Luge.

I am pleased to present to you a report on the past season which, despite some challenges, represents a remarkable chapter in the history of The FIL Luge.

The past season was undoubtedly characterized by difficult weather conditions that affected our ability to ensure fair racing conditions. Nevertheless, we adapted quickly as an organization to ensure that the competitions ran as smoothly and fairly as possible. What was particularly impressive was the excellent cooperation of everyone involved, especially after the adverse race conditions at the first World Cup in Oberhof. Together, we were able to make decisions at short notice and adjust the start order to improve the quality of the races.

Another highlight of this season was undoubtedly the performance of the FIL Media Team under the leadership of Margit Dengler. The decision to swap photographers played a key role in achieving significantly better quality in our coverage. The competition among the photographers significantly increased both the quality and variety of the images, which was reflected in the diverse photos and media content.

However, where there was room for improvement last season was certainly the lack of variety in the race calendar with five stops in Germany and two stops in Latvia. This was not well received by the athletes and unfortunately led to many injuries at the end of the season.

# Report from the Executive Directors to the 72<sup>nd</sup> FIL Congress 2024

Dear Ladies and Gentlemen, Dear friends of our sport,

My report for the past financial year 2023/24 is once again intended to provide you with a rough overview of the activities of the FIL office.

The change to the statutes adopted by the 2023 FIL Congress made it possible to found the **FIL Vermarktungs- und Veranstaltungs GmbH** on September 1, 2023, which I have the honor of chairing as Managing Director. With the establishment of this limited liability company, in which the FIL holds 100% of the shares, it has now become possible to outsource essential and, above all, cost-intensive areas to this limited liability company.

Examples include organizer contracts for artificial track, TV productions for artificial track and natural track as well as costs for the TV coordinator and press officer for artificial track. On the income side, various sponsorship contracts for artificial track were settled via the GmbH. In addition to tax benefits, the improved liability position of the elected members of the presidium should also be mentioned here. I would like to expressly thank the Austrian experts Anton Androsch (tax) and Gernot Schaar (legal), who provided us with excellent support in drawing up the founding documents and commencing the operational business activities of the GmbH. Our Vice President of Finance will go into more detail on the GmbH's annual balance sheet in his annual report.

In the second half of the past financial year, we unfortunately realized that FIL's accountant was unable to meet our expectations. This resulted in enormous and unexpected additional work for my colleagues in the FIL office, and consequently, the FIL's accounting tasks were outsourced to a specialized law firm in Salzburg. I would like to express my thanks to my colleagues Anja Fischer and Diana Springl, who together with me ensured that all FIL member federations, event organizers and athletes received the payments due to them on time.

A major focus of activities last year was and still is the topic of the **2026 Winter Olympics and track in Cortina**. It should not go unmentioned that these challenges are associated with an enormous amount of travel, time and work for our President, our Secretary General and our Track Construction Commission experts under the leadership of Markus Aschauer. The FIL office needs to provide a wide range of coordinative assistance.

I would now like to highlight a few projects that have been completed in the past year or are still ongoing, but which are not so well known to the public. Once again, these are all projects that are only indirectly related to our sport of luge, but which have become indispensable for an international Olympic sports federation:

I have mentioned it several times in the past and I will do so again:

The FIL office with its staff and directors is YOUR service point, valued delegates and stakeholders.

Please do not hesitate to contact us if you have any questions or need assistance.

#### Anti-Doping Measures

In the past sport year, we are pleased to report that we did not have a single case of doping. Although we are a "low risk" sport in doping matters, the FIL family must also fully comply with all the conditions and regulations contained in the WADA Anti-Doping Code. In particular, the topic of "anti-doping education" is given high priority. In order to ensure uniform and comprehensible documentation as the FIL, the positive completion of the WADA's online education program "ADEL" has been defined as a condition for the FIL licensing of athletes. We ask for your understanding that neither we nor the ITA are able to assess the plausibility and completeness of individual anti-doping education programs of the NADOS or the federations.

Once again, my personal thanks go to our competent staff member Diana Springl, Dr. Christian Krähe, and the ITA experts for their excellent work.

#### - Data Protection

As already announced in my report to last year's Congress, the FIL is undergoing a data protection audit to ensure that the FIL's internal and external work processes and the handling of communication tools comply with the European General Data Protection Regulation (EU GDPR). It should not go unmentioned here that both the time and bureaucratic effort involved is considerable, for which I would like to thank Diana Springl and Dr. Christian Krähe. Financial investment in the ongoing safeguarding of data security is also necessary.

Here too, please understand if you or your athletes are asked to sign various data protection documents - it is simply necessary.

#### - Electronic License, Data Bank

The introduction of the electronic license has led to much more efficient license management. In the next step, we also want to use this license database to generate start lists, result lists, result statistics and overall results for FIL competitions. In addition to avoiding various typing errors in athlete names and the fully automatic generation of overall results, a uniform interface to the TV graphics program "Chyron", which was acquired by the FIL last year, has been defined as an objective.

I would like to thank my colleagues Anja Fischer and Daniela Schwab, the sport director Matthias Böhmer and the company DokuMe, who have been in charge of this project and continue to do so.

# FIL payment transactions with the national federations; FIL development programs

In the course of the review of the accounting for the year 2023/24 carried out in the FIL office in cooperation with the external accounting office, the need for changes regarding settlements / subsidy payments of the FIL with the national federations was identified. The workflow must be partially revised; our Vice President of Finance, Geoff Balme, will inform you about this in a timely manner.

In addition to the topics mentioned above, my staff and I are the permanent contact and service point for you, dear delegates, as well as for all our officials, partner companies, agencies, technical directors and external employees. We try to deal with your requests and concerns at all times to the best of our knowledge and belief and as professionally as possible.

We also look forward to your personal visit to the FIL office.

My colleagues on the FIL Presidium and the Vice Presidents and Directors responsible for the respective areas will report on all other relevant topics in their reports.

As always, I would like to conclude my report by thanking



#### Report from the Sport Director of the International Luge Federation - Matthias Böhmer

Dear members of the 2024 FIL Congress,

On behalf of the International Luge Federation, I would like to give you an overview of the past 2023-2024 season and highlight some important events.

After a long absence, Lake Placid was back on the calendar as a prologue race in the EBERSPÄCHER World Cup. The organization of this event was excellent and gives hope for more great events in Lake Placid in the future. The return to Lake Placid was a significant step for our sport and was welcomed by teams, athletes, and fans alike.

Another highlight of the season was the successful World Championship test in Whistler. This test run went smoothly and allowed us to gain important insights for the upcoming 53rd FIL World Championships in 2025.

Overall, the season was characterized by numerous double World Cups in Central Europe. Unfortunately, these events were not positive for everyone involved. Teams as well as athletes, partners and media expressed concerns. We will carefully analyze this feedback in order to make improvements for the coming seasons.

The highlight of the season was undoubtedly the 52nd FIL World Championships in Altenberg, Germany. The organizers from Altenberg seamlessly followed on from the equally fantastic World Championships in Oberhof. Numerous spectators followed the exciting competitions in the Erzgebirge on all three race days. The TV broadcast times and access to the FIL livestream were very satisfactory and made a very positive contribution to the popularity of our sport.

Unfortunately, the past season was also characterized by rapidly changing weather conditions, especially following the World Championships. At the last three World Cups, the race organizers had to adjust the starting order according to the weather conditions, in line with the guidelines of the International Luge Federation. Although there was initial resistance from various teams, the "new" starting order became widely accepted by the end of the season and was very well received by athletes, coaches and the media.

Another success of the past season was the integration of the women's doubles into the team relay, which went successfully and without any major difficulties. Initial concerns regarding the length and safety of the "new" relay proved to be unfounded. According to many experts, the team relay gained in excitement and now relied on another important characteristic for success: continuity.

With the integration of the women's doubles, we saw a welcome increase in excitement in the Team Relay. The teams' performances were less predictable, which led to surprises on the podium. Teams that were previously considered favorites struggled with unexpected challenges, while underdogs like Romania and China achieved surprisingly good placings.

The average number of participants of around 9 relay teams per event was also a success. We hope to further increase this number in the future by making the team relay more attractive to teams from all over the world and encouraging participation.

The team relay has proven to be an exciting addition to our events and helps to make the sport of luge more accessible to a wider audience. We will continue to work on improving the quality and appeal of the team relay to strengthen the success of our sport worldwide.

An emerging problem that became apparent last season is the availability of high-quality track training before the start of the competition season and during the season itself. Particularly for nations without their own luge tracks, there is currently only limited opportunity to obtain training times with optimal ice conditions, especially in Central Europe. In order to counteract this

problem, it is crucial that the International Luge Federation maintains even closer contact with the operators of the luge tracks. The aim is to integrate as many high-quality track units as possible for the teams. This requires a proactive approach to ensure that all athletes have equal training opportunities and can prepare for competitions under optimal conditions.

We will meet these challenges with determination and do everything we can to ensure that the sport of luge continues to be promoted at the highest level and that all athletes receive the best possible training conditions.

The women's doubles discipline continues to present us with major challenges. Although we have managed to stabilize the number of participants, the number of new women's doubles starters is stagnating. This not only leads to a limited starting field in this discipline, but also means that some nations are no longer able to field team relays due to a lack of women's doubles teams.

To counteract this problem, a women's doubles course was successfully held in Innsbruck-Igls at the beginning of the season. This initiative was aimed at promoting interest and participation in the discipline and attracting new pairs. In addition, the women's doubles teams were offered additional training sessions and runs during the current World Cup season. These measures have proven to be very positive and have helped to raise the performance level of the participants.

Nevertheless, we must continue to push to recruit new women's doubles pairs and strengthen both the discipline itself and the team relay as much as possible. It is vital that we work together to realize the full potential of this discipline and ensure that all nations have the opportunity to field qualified teams to participate in World Cup events and other competitions.

We will continue to take action to promote the development of the women's doubles discipline and ensure that it remains a fixture in international luge.

#### Report: Technical Director Artificial Track - Andris Sics

Dear Members of the International Luge Federation (FIL),

I am pleased to present the annual report as the Technical Director of the Artificial Track for the luge season 2023/2024. This report encapsulates the progress, challenges, and initiatives undertaken throughout the season to advance our sport. **Overview:** 

The luge season 2023/2024 witnessed remarkable achievements and significant developments in various aspects of artificial track luge. From enhancing athlete experiences to fostering global participation, our efforts have been dedicated to promoting the growth and sustainability of luge worldwide.

In the 2023/2024 season there were 9 luge World Cups, 6 Team Relay World Cup, 3 Sprint World Cups, the Continental Champions (Race in Race), and as season highlight, the 52<sup>nd</sup> FIL World Championships in Altenberg/ GER on the program.

In addition to the permanent technical delegate (TechDir), another two technical delegate and 3 Jury members were nominated for all competitions in consultation with Sport Director, the event organizers and the FIL. The assigned tasks were implemented to the fullest satisfaction. The technical inspections were carried out at all venues according to the 2022 IRO, with the pre-inspection being offered weekly.

Thanks to the very good cooperation between organizational teams and track operators, excellent and fair training and competition conditions, despite challenging weather conditions, could be offered at all venues.

#### **Key Highlights:**

#### Technical Expert Group Slide 2026:

Upon the recommendation of the Vice President of Technical Matters, Armin Zöggeler, and in consultation with the Sports Director and myself, the FIL Presidium established the "Technical Expert Group Slide 2026." This group, comprised of experts from major sports federations, was tasked with standardizing dimensions for sled components to ensure compatibility and facilitate accessibility for all athletes worldwide. The Technical Expert Group Slide 2026 diligently worked to establish unit dimensions for crucial luge parts, including the distance between bridges, bridge dimensions, width between bridge legs, and specifications for steel and runner holes. Additionally, specifications for the bridge box and steel lengths were determined to streamline sled production and enhance uniformity across sleds. FIL is actively identifying multiple manufacturers with the capability to produce sleds and parts. The plan is for National Federations (NFs) to have the opportunity to produce sled parts themselves. NFs with the capacity to produce sleds in-house will have the option to do so, while those unable to do so can purchase sleds from manufacturers. This approach aims to empower NFs, particularly those with limited resources, fostering self-sustainability and promoting the development of luge in emerging regions. Working Group Strategic Plan-Slide 2026 "Technology Artificial Track (AT)" During the season, the Working Group Strategic Plan-Slide 2026 "Technology Artificial Track (AT)" met to discuss enhancements to the weighting procedure. It was identified that an opportunity has emerged to collaborate with a university to develop

data and analyze the effect of weight on the results. This collaboration presents a promising avenue to devise an effective solution that ensures fair and equal opportunities for all athletes.

#### Implementation of Dokume Weigh-in Program

During the luge season 2023/2024, a new weigh-in program developed by Dokume was introduced to streamline the weighing process and facilitate digital communication. This initiative aimed to eliminate the need for hardcopy documents and expedite communication throughout the entire process, from start to finish. The Dokume Weigh-in Program represents a significant step forward in embracing digital solutions to enhance efficiency and accessibility within the sport of luge.

#### Workshop for Jury, Technical Delegates, Race Directors and Officials

Prior to the commencement of the luge season, a specialized workshop was organized. This workshop aimed to thoroughly review crucial aspects of their role, address inquiries, and provide necessary explanations.

Conducted in both English and German languages, the workshop ensured comprehensive understanding and engagement among participants regardless of linguistic preference.

Key topics covered during the workshop included:

- Interpretation and implementation of competition rules and regulations.
- Duties and responsibilities during competitions, including track inspections and athlete briefings.
- Communication protocols with event organizers, officials, and athletes.
- Handling of technical issues, protests, and appeals.
- Coordination with the Jury and Race Directors to ensure smooth event operations.

#### Open-Door Policy for Technical Inspection

During the first World Cup of the luge season, a streamlined approach was taken to technical inspections. Two four-hour time slots were allocated, but inspections were conducted continuously without breaks. This efficient process was made possible by the invaluable assistance of lokal TD and Reto Gily, benefiting both athletes and officials.

Additionally, every Thursday offered two inspection windows, with doors open for immediate requests. This flexible policy aimed to prevent unnecessary disqualifications, resulting in only three athletes disqualified in the 2023/2024 season.

#### New Training Shoes for Athlete Safety

In the upcoming seasons, athletes will benefit from new training shoes designed to enhance safety and prevent foot injuries. These shoes feature safer soles and include ankle bone protectors. Further communication with the manufacturer is underway to finalize implementation.

Finally, I would like to thank the entire Presidium and Executive Board of the International Luge Federation, the members of the TC Artificial Track, all organizers with their teams, coaches and athletes and the Sports Director for their very good cooperation.

#### **Report 2024 Commission Youth and Development AT**

Ladies and Gentlemen, Dear friends of our sport,

The 2023/24 season had two season highlights with the 4th YOG in Pyeongchang and the 39th Junior World Championships in Lillehammer.

#### **Commission Youth/Development:**

The Youth/Development Commission met on March 15 and 16, 2024 in St. Leonhard/Grödig. Matthias Böhmer (Sport Director), Andris Sics (Technical Director) and Fred Zimny (Development Director) were kindly invited to attend the meeting to discuss the intersections between Juniors, the General Class and the Development Program.

I would like to take a closer look at the following points.

#### **Evaluation Junior World Cup:**

The first three races of the season were held in North America Park City (1st + 2nd) and Whistler (3rd). The fields of participants were also manageable due to the qualification races for the 4th YOG in Pyeongchang taking place at the same time in Winterberg and Oberhof. The fields of participants at the 4th JWC in Winterberg and the 5th JWC in Bludenz were also not as large as in previous years due to the 4th YOG in Pyeongchang taking place at the same time, but from the 6th JWC in St. Moritz the field was again as hoped for.

A total of 20 nations took part in the six JWCs, which is quite impressive considering the circumstances. For the future, the race calendar must be better adapted to the individual racing series in order to avoid overlaps here, and the races outside Europe must also be planned in such a way that the national federations are offered a complete package with transport, hotel, etc., in order to minimize the effort for the individual national federations and to make these races more attractive.

#### **Evaluation 39th Junior World Championships Lillehammer:**

81 sleds from 19 nations and 8 teams took part in the team competition at the 39th JWCh in Lillehammer. The JWCh was very well organized by the Norwegian federation, in addition to an appealing opening ceremony, further side events were offered for the teams. Lillehammer proved to be a very good host and organized a great JWCh for the juniors. The cooperation with everyone involved in the organization and the competition team was very pleasant and professional.

The track conditions were very good from the ITW to the end of the competitions.

The medals were shared by six nations, which is a positive result.

#### **Evaluation 4th YOG Pyeongchang:**

The 4th YOG began with four qualification races, 2x Winterberg and 2x Oberhof.

During these qualification races, we realized that the level of many athletes was not at the desired level. Many athletes had problems mastering the starting heights safely. This is not a good development and needs to be addressed for the next YOG qualification.

A total of 31 women, 23 men, 10 women's doubles and 14 men's doubles qualified for the YOG.

The 4th YOG in Pyeongchang was the highlight of the season for the 2006-2009 age groups.

The track conditions were very good and the training and races were very well organized. It was a very good and harmonious cooperation between the organization and the responsible persons of the FIL. On behalf of the FIL, I would like to thank KLF, the track and the entire team for the really great cooperation.

The YOG showed that the decision to hold an ITW and a test event in February 2023 was the right one to test all processes and the athletes were able to gain track experience.

The medals were shared by four nations, which is a positive result.

#### Comment:

As in my last report, I would like to draw attention to the development in doubles junior and youth A male and female. The development has stagnated or continues to decline (see table).

If no suitable measures are introduced here, I see this discipline as being at risk after the 2026 Olympic Games.

The 2024/25 season includes six Junior World Cups, one Continental Cup in Pyeongchang, three Continental Cups in North America and four Continental Cups in Europe. The 40th Junior World Championships will take place from 28.01. to 02.02.2024 in St. Moritz.

#### Conclusion

On behalf of the Youth/Development Commission, I would like to thank the event organizers and the track operators for staging the races despite the sometimes impassable conditions, and thank the organizations involved for their goodwill in organizing races for the youth. Special thanks go to the Presidium and the Executive Board with President Einars Fogelis at the helm, who always have an open ear for the youth and for the trust they have placed in my work for the youth of the FIL.

## **FIL Medical Commission Report 2024**

The Medical Commission has been working on many items this year.

- 1) Unanimous approval of the voluntary use of a flexible neck collar to assist with injury reduction to the head and neck. This has been submitted to the FIL technical commission with strict requirements on material composition and sizes. This issue is awaiting final approval for use in the 2024 season and beyond.
- 2) The FIL had a successful Youth Olympic Games. There were no major injuries. We had excellent coordination with the local medical authorities and national team medical staff.
- 3) The coordination of antidoping education, testing and TUE approvals with ITA continues to be a successful collaboration. The cost of ITA is appropriate to amount of work, staff and accuracy needed in this important aspect of modern International sport.
- 4) A FIL injury reporting form is being developed for the 2024- future seasons. This form has been adapted from the IBSF injury reporting form. The form will be filled out for each athlete who sustains an injury in official training and races. Once the form has approval of FIL it will be distributed to all the tracks in the world to be filled out by the track medical team and emailed to the FIL office at the conclusion of each FIL event.
- 5) A FIL plan on Sport Related Conclusion based on the recent Amsterdam Consensus is being worked on as a collaboration of the medical and technical commissions.
- 6) The medical commission will meet in person for the first time this fall for a in person meeting at FIL office in Berchtesgaden.

# Report of the Acting Ethics Authority (72nd FIL Congress 2024 in Lake Placid, New York, USA)

Like my predecessors, I cannot report on the content of cases, i.e. proceedings based on notifications of violations of the FIL Ethics Code, because as a rule they must not be reported for reasons of personal privacy and the requirement of confidentiality of information and incidents. However, I am allowed to report on the type, number and outcome of cases, and this should be reported.

Statistically speaking, I have only received one notification since taking on my acting role in November 2023. Categorically, the case belongs to the group of violations of the prohibitions of discrimination and violation of personal rights. However, it was a minor violation; the proceedings were therefore discontinued in accordance with the provisions of the FIL Ethics Code after the submission of a voluntary undertaking in the form of a cease-and-desist declaration.

Nevertheless, the question arises as to why only one case was reported to me. Looking at the number of cases reported with other sports federations, the number seems low, even if you consider that the FIL is a relatively small sports federation. The reasons for this can be manifold: violations are instead reported to the NFs at national level, the opportunity to report is not taken up for various reasons, for example due to ignorance of the Ethics Code, or because the existence of the Ethics Authority and its function are not sufficiently known, or because there are fears of reporting violations at all, or there were actually no other violations in the period in question.

I see the external Ethics Authority, who is not a member of the executive, as being not only responsible for ensuring that reported ethics violations are sanctioned, but also for ensuring that violations are reported at all, or better still, preventively, that an environment and a mindset are created in which violations do not occur in the first place. This applies to all areas covered by the Ethics Code, i.e. the protection of athletes from physical, psychological or sexual violence, compliance with fair play in sport, the ban on manipulation and the ban on doping, protection from injuries through technical safety, equal treatment, diversity and inclusion, sustainability and the integrity of all federation decisions and measures.

Against this background, the FIL's current intensive work on a comprehensive Sport Integrity Program is therefore very much to be welcomed, with the initial focus on a Safe Sport Program. In addition to the introduction of a Safe Sport Code and a reporting system for violations, the focus is on creating an environment that will act responsibly in line with the goals of Safe Sport and the integrity of the sport of luge and that will extend into the structures of the FIL members.

Dear Luge Family,

This is the inaugral FIL Sport Integrity Manager's report and I want to thank everyone for their trust and support as I navigated this first season in analzing what gaps exist across the FIL within sport integrity and develop the strategic priorities needed to begin building our FIL Sport Integrity Unit and in turn, create a positive, safe, and trusted sport of Luge. Sport Integrity, including Safe Sport, is a strategic priority of SLIDE 2026. Building off of my sport integrity strategic framework presented at last year's Congress, the FIL Executive moved forward last Fall to begin and realize the implementation of a FIL Sport Integrity Unit. To begin the building process of this, the FIL brought me on and has entrusted me as their first full-time Sport Integrity Manager, a postion I began September 1, 2023. I ask for your trust as well, as I come with 35 years of Athlete, Coach, Board, and Officiating Luge experience as well as 25 years of police experience, many as a Detective working in Child Abuse and Child Protection.

I applaud the FIL Presidium in realizing that this is a critically important step forward for the organization in ensuring we have a positive, safe, and trusted sport of Luge for all particapants and our FIL National Federations (NFs) as we continue improving the sport of Luge for the next generation of sliders. I ensured that time was taken for the leadership to gain an understanding of the six areas of sport integrity, the components that are critical to implement in each area, and the importance of IFs taking the lead in first building out sport integrity at the international level in order to best assist our NFs to lead sport integrity at the national level.


Building a sport integrity unit from the ground up is no small task and I ask for your patience and willingness to learn as this is a new area and era for the FIL. To fully realize the implementation of the FIL Sport Integrity Unit and all its components, this will be a strategy plan over the next 2-3 seasons. I look forward to your collaboration as I reach out to our Luge family for assistance and input on many of the initiatives that are needed to implement.

This past season I examnined the status of sport integrity across the international level, conferring with our FIL Ethics Authority, the IOC Safeguarding Unit and many other IF Sport Integrity leads to assess best practices and develop effective working relationships across Winter IF Sport Integrity community. This will enable effective information sharing and collaboration, especially within our sliding sport family of IBSF. From this, I developed, what I believe, are the first phase of essential, key strategic sport integrity priorities across our six pillars of sport integrity, with a key focus on Safe Sport, Equality-





Diversity-Inclusion (EDI), and Athlete Welness/Injury Prevention. To refresh you on what we idenitified as our six pillars of Sport Integrity, the chart below details each of them:



As I begin 2024-2025 season preparations, I want to highlight some items from this past season and some of the key priorities I will be working on within the six pillars over the course of this coming season.

#### Highlights of 2023-2024 and insights into 2024-25

- FIL Office (Sept 2023) I worked out of the FIL Office to onboard with staff, sport integrity strategic planning discussions, and meetings with Biathlon Integrity Unit leads to discuss sharing and collaboration.
- Represented the FIL at Safe Sport International's Global Conference in London, UK. (Sept 2023)
- Represented the FIL at the IOC Transgender/Gender Participation policy development workshop in Lausanne that provided an effective framework for IFs to utilize in reserching, discussing, and developing their own position/policy in this area (Spring 2023)
- Prevention of Manipulation in Competiton:
  - I completed IOC onboarding as the point of contact person between the FIL and the IOC's Olympic Movement Unit for the Prevention of Manipulation in Competiton (OM Unit PMC).
  - o YOG 2024 Online Education I organized through the OM Unit PMC the online education modules for all FIL Officials, Athletes, and Coaches attending YOG 2024.
  - The IOCs OM Unit PMC released their study reults on the topic of Technological Manipulation, lookig at how equipment can have the potentail to manipulate reults. This study included a survey to all summer and winter IFs and analysis of current research. FIL Safe Sport Framework Initiatives



- **1. FIL Safe Sport Code of Conduct Policy**: I completed a Draft policy with a comprehenisive review and revision phase still to come with a variety of stakeholders, including Ethics, Legal, and the Athlete Commission. The goal would be to have this policy approved and in play for the 2024-2025 season. Ahead of the launch of the policy, a communication and education strategy will be rolled out to all FIL Staff, Board, Commissions, NFs, Athletes, and Entourage.
- **2.** *Independent Reporting Line*: I spent the season researching and analyzing the various types of Safe Sport Independent Reporting systems that companies provide to identify one that best fits the needs and scope of the FIL that is barrier-free, user-friendly, secure, and confidential for the intake of all safe sport and sport integrity concerns or complaints that service all FIL sanctioned events and activities. At the time of writing this report, the proposals are currently in the review process and awating the approval of our new Independent Reporting system. As with the Safe Sport policy launch, a communication and education strategy will be rolled out to all NFs, Athletes, and Entourage detailing the new reporting line.
- **3**. Safe Sport Education and Participant Engagement: The first prioritiy focus needed to be on drafting the Safe Sport Code of Conduct Policy and the research to identify an Independent Reporting system so the proper structures are in place before shifting to athlete/entourage/NF engagement and, in turn, the design and delivery of the Safe Sport Education:

**2024-2025 Safeguarding Engagement, Assessment and Education**: This coming season will see a series of sport integrity engagements, both in person, virtually, and surevys with our NFs, Athletes, Coaches/Entourage, with an initial focus on Safe Sport, Athlete Wellness, and Equality-Diversity-Inclusion (EDI). Working collaboratively, and with a listening ear to your feedback, wil be critical to properly assessing what's working, what's in place with safeguarding frameworks, and where gaps exist so that the FIL can best postion itself to have the proper tools in place to assist all NFs and FIL participants across the six pillars of sport integrity.

#### ❖ NF Safeguarding Survey coming this Summer

The first engagement this summer will be an NF Safeguarding Assessment survey, sent to all NFs, to gauge where each NF is at regarding Safe Sport, Injury Prevention, and EDI policies and frameworks. This will allow me to identify gaps and assist NFs, that require it, to ensure effective safeguarding measures and frameworks are in place across all of our NFs.





#### ❖ Safe Sport Training at FIL level coming this Fall

A suitable Safe Sport online education platform will be identified in order to implement required Safe Sport education across identified areas of the FIL, including staff and Board.

- FIL Equality-Diversity-Inclusion: I completed a Draft policy with a comprehensive review and revision phase still to come with a variety of stakeholders including Ethics, Legal, and the Athlete Commission. The goal would be to have this policy approved and in play for the 2024-2025 season. Ahead of the launch of the policy, a communication and education strategy will be rolled out to all FIL Staff, Board, Commissions, NFs, Athletes, and Entourage.
- FIL Sustainability: In the Fall of 2023, the various FIL groups working on Sustainability were consolidated into one FIL Sustainability Working Group under Sport Integrity that is now lead by Hannah Campbell-Pegg and Julian von Schleinitz. This season, progress was realized with two projects that Hannah and Julian will elaborate more on in their report presentation to Congress. In short, working with the Race Organizing Committees (ROCs), two pilot sustainability data collection projects were carried out at the Senior and Junior World Championships in Altenberg and Lillehammer respectively. The analysis of this data can be used to not only expand data collection at other FIL sanctioned events but help lead the way for the FIL and ROCs to develop more sustainable events in the future. Going forward this season will see more collaborative discussions and inititiatives with the IBSF, working together to create long-term sustainability of our sliding sports.

#### Athlete Welness & Injury Prevention

Initial discussions were had with the Medical Commission on a variety of injury prevention and athlete wellness topics in conjunction with the Athlete Commission. More discussions are forthcoming over the summer on the followig topics to examine possible initiatives in these areas:

- Resource, education, and awareness tools on Athlete Wellness, including mental health, nutrition.
- Concussion awareness, education, training/competiton protocols

#### FIL Website: Addition of Sport Integrity section

We will be adding a sport integrity section to the FIL website. It will cover five of the six pillars as Anti-Doping already has a section of its own. I am currently working on the new templates for each section that will contain documents and links for policies, awareness, education, resources, and frameworks to build out safeguarding at your own NF, etc. When the revisions are complete I will work with FIL Communications to communicate all of the new additions to the NFs.

Finally, I would like to thank the Presidium & Executive Board, the Athlete Commission and to all NFs and Participants for your support and trust given to me to implement and elevate the FIL in all areas of Sport Integrity. I look forward to a productive season ahead as we move from development of the forementioned initiatives to implementation.

#### Report TV Coordinator 2023/24 (Artificial Track)

#### TV Exposure

With a total airtime of 380 hours and 373 million viewers the TV coverage of the 2023/24 Eberspaecher Luge World Cup and the 52nd FIL Luge World Championships increased compared to the previous season.

The World Championships accounted for the largest share of TV broadcasts and ratings with more than 51 hours of airtime and 81 million viewers. All other events had more than 30 hours of broadcasting time and an average of 32 million viewers.

In Germany, as in previous years, *ARD* and *ZDF* again generated by far the most viewers (95 percent) with 353 million viewers in a total of just over 20 hours of broadcasting time (this corresponds to a five percent share of total coverage in the 2023/24 season). The majority of the live, delayed and highlights broadcasts in Germany achieved more than two or three million viewers with market shares of up to 22.7 percent. A record rating (5.79 million viewers and a market share of 33.9 percent) was achieved with the summary of the men's doubles at Winterberg on ARD and at eight of the ten events, the luge coverage ranked in the top 10 of all *ARD* and *ZDF broadcasts* on the respective days, even several times on some weekends.

Regular, comprehensive coverage with live, delayed or highlights broadcasts was carried out on *ORF, ORF* Sport+ and *ORF ON+* (Austria). The top result on ORF1 was achieved by the summary of the women's doubles at the World Championship with 423,000 viewers and a market share of 36 percent. Almost all races were aired live in Latvia on *TV6* and *tv3*. In Canada, *CBC Sports* reported live from the women's singles at Whistler, all other races of the season could be watched on *CBC Live Streaming*.

A detailed TV evaluation is included in the Congress Dossier.

#### FIL Live Streaming / FIL Studio

As in the previous season, all races were aired live on the *FIL YouTube channel* with the experienced commentary of Tim Singer and Bree Schaaf as well as a rotating cast of athletes as co-commentators. Due to TV contracts, the live streaming was geo-blocked for Austria, Latvia and (partly) Germany. FIL Studio produced background information, analysis and interviews on the *FIL YouTube channel* before the start of the race, between the runs and after the race, presented by former US national team athlete Kate Hansen.

#### **New TV Graphics Provider**

For the 2023/24 season, the FIL had appointed a new TV graphics, ChyronHego. In close cooperation with the ChyonHego team the basic graphics for the international signal were created and additional graphic elements were developed.

#### FIL Communication 2023/2024

From September 2023 to March 2024, weekly **press releases** were sent to a German and a separate English-language media distribution list and published as news on the **FIL website and Platform X** - formerly Twitter.

In over **500 tweets on Platform X** last year, links to FIL **press releases**, the website, winner postings and competition results were distributed. In addition to targeted press releases to a personal, English-language and separate German-language press distribution list, Twitter is an important medium for distrubuting FIL news. Preliminary reports for the new race week and race reports are published weekly on the FIL website and sent to the media. Press releases on the season opener, the championships, and statistics were sent out.

**Platform X** achieved a total of 937,100 impressions from December 5, 2023, to March 4, 2024 - an average of 10,300 impressions per day and 13,500 link clicks. 379 retweets, 433 replies and 2,000 likes.

#### First social media prize for athletes 2024 awarded.

Italy's Leon Felderer received the first FIL Social Media Prize with his reel for #FILMovieNight - endowed with a cheque for 1,000 euros.



In the period from December 10, 2023 to March 10, 2024, a reach of 2.8 million fans was achieved on **Facebook**. On March 10, 2024, the FIL account had **39,100 followers**. 40.1% of these are women and 59.9% are men.

The post with the largest organic reach was the following: "9 competitions, 6 countries with medals, Medal Table from 29.01.2024."



The reach was 161,077 people, which was 2.843% higher than the average on Facebook.

The FIL **Instagram** account had: **9,049 followers** (38.4 % women & 61.6 % men) on March 10, 2024 and reached 1.8 million followers in 90 days of the winter season (an increase of 180.3 %). There were 85,054 content interactions (i.e. likes, comments and shared content). This corresponds to an increase of 316.8 %.


The most successful reach on Instagram was achieved by the reel on Norbert Loch's farewell on 03.03.2024. The reach of this post was 51,536 accounts.

The post with the most comments was: "Julia Taubitz becomes Sprint World Champion" from 26.01.2024. This post had 101 comments.



In the 2023/2024 season, the FIL **YouTube** channel once again received the greatest financial and personnel investment. Due to the live broadcasts of the races, the FIL Studio Show, which was broadcast for the first time in the same stream as the competitions, and the advertising budget, the number of followers has now reached **5,600**.

The following trend can be seen on the YouTube and TikTok channels: "TikTok getting longer, YouTube getting shorter". We have therefore expanded the shorts on YouTube in 2023/2024. These are currently still being pushed by Google. Most of the videos published on **TikTok** are currently the same as the reels on Instagram.

# Report on the FIL Development Program: 2023-2024 Season Fred Zimny, FIL Development Director

The 2023-2024 FIL Development Program could be characterized as having a primary focus on youth athletes from underrepresented and underfunded nations. The catalyst for this was of course the PyeongChang YOG in February 2024. As a result of this focus, every nation participating with the FIL Youth A group was able to qualify at least one athlete for YOG and in several cases, two athletes. Though YOG preparation played a large role in the 23-24 season for Youth A, significant levels of support and programs were also in place for Junior and General Class athletes, as outlined below.

Just as every nation is a team, so is the FIL and there are a number of individuals who played a defining role in making the FIL development program a success in 2023-2024. Most notably, Dwight Bell, FIL Secretary General, Claire DelNegro, FIL Vice President of Sport and Christoph Schweiger, FIL Executive Director. Their support, knowledge and guidance throughout the season was invaluable.

#### **FIL Coaches**

Leading the FIL Groups was a cadre of coaches with a wealth of experience. Ioan Apostol (ROU) returned as Head Coach of FIL Group 1, with Ivars Deinis (LAT) joining him as Assistant Coach. Father and son team Petr Kinzel and Tomas Kinzel (CZE) continued their long-standing positions with FIL Group 2 as Head Coach and Assistant Coach respectively. And overseeing the Youth A Group was Head Coach Bogdan Macovei (ROU) and Assistant Coach Martins Lozbers (LAT). The FIL is very fortunate to have such a skilled, knowledgeable, professional and experienced crew guiding the athletes participating in the FIL development program.

#### **FIL Groups**

The FIL Groups have long been a lifeline for National Federations with few athletes, little funding and no luge facilities of their own. This season continued with three separate FIL Groups, which included: Group 1 (General Class), Group 2 (Junior Class) and the Youth A Group, which consists of young athletes who are either brand new or have very little experience. These athletes trained under the guidance of FIL coaches during scheduled training weeks and participated in Continental Cup and YOG qualifying events.

#### **Luge School**

The 2023-2024 season was a unique one regarding the annual FIL Luge School, as there were actually two schools scheduled this season. The first took place Oct 9-17 in Lillehammer and was funded for accommodations, meals and track fees by an IOC Olympic Solidarity Grant. The school was an overwhelming success with 14 nations, 27 athletes and 14 international coaches participating.

The second luge school was the first of its kind and focused on nations from the greater Asia region. Taking place in PyeongChang immediately after the conclusion of YOG, five nations participated. Special thanks must go to the Korean Luge Federation and Mr. Hyunjun Park, as well as the PyeongChang Legacy Foundation and Mr. Arram Kim for their generous support covering the cost of accommodations, meals and track fees. The IOC also provided support for travel costs through an Olympic Solidarity Grant. The support of these organizations and individuals was critical, without which the Asia Luge School would not have come to fruition. Logistics arrangements and coaching were provided by the FIL. Following the school, several of these first-time sliders went on to join the FIL Youth A Group for additional training and racing. A breakdown of the participation at both schools is as follows:

#### YOG

The Youth Olympic Games was of course the primary focus of Youth A age athletes for the 2023-2024 season. Taking place between January 19-February 1, all nations that were part of the FIL Youth A Group qualified at least one athlete for the Games. This was a true testament to the expertise and effectiveness of the FIL coaching staff that contributed to this success. The 11 FIL Youth A Group nations that had athletes qualify for YOG include: BUL, CZE, FRA, GBR, GEO, IRL, NED, NZL, SLO, THA and TPE.

#### **NF Programs**

Funding was allocated to numerous National Federations for specific development related projects targeted at athlete recruitment, increasing participation or conducting development level training camps. Budget limitations affected how many projects could be funded, but in total €44,000 was allocated amongst 12 different nations.

#### **New Nations**

New nations currently in the process of seeking, or who have already obtained, FIL membership include MGL, NGR, PAK and TUN.

#### **Olympic Solidarity Grants**

As mentioned earlier, special thanks must go to the IOC Olympic Solidarity Grant program and specifically to Sheila Stephens Desbans and her team and Marc Faraci for his guidance. The FIL was able to secure several grants benefiting nations identified as underrepresented in the last Winter Olympic Games, including: the Lillehammer Luge School, Asia Region Luge School and travel assistance for disadvantaged Asia region nations.

#### **Partnerships**

The popular FIL Partnership Program, in which a smaller developing nation is partnered with a larger, established nation, was again a success in 2023-2024. The FIL supported the program with an allocation to the host nation of €300 per athlete per race, for a maximum of 1M, 1W, 1 MD and 1 WD sled per nation. It is the goal to encourage other large nations to partner with smaller, developing nations in the future.

#### Vouchers

Another popular program that continued this season was the allocation of track vouchers. Valued at €25 per voucher, most nations received a quantity of vouchers based on number of athletes, length of participation and need. Because of the budget situation, the decision was made to not allocate vouchers to nations that have a home track.

#### **Summer Camp**

In order to better prepare athletes for winter training and competition, a summer camp took place in July 2023 in Smrzovka, CZE and Oberhof, GER. In Smrzovka, development athletes from the FIL groups took part in physical testing, physical training and wheel sled training. This was followed by 3 days in Oberhof which focused on start practice on the Oberhof refrigerated start ramp. In recent years, the coaches have observed that many athletes participating with the FIL group have not been properly physically prepared for the stresses involved during inseason training/racing. For both safety and performance reasons, it was determined that young athletes should be

taught the basic off-season physical training skills needed to perform to their highest potential. The summer camp addresses these skills.

#### Conclusion

While budget issues continue to affect how much support is available through FIL Development, significant effort is made to distribute the limited funds to development level nations in the most equitable way and where they can have the most impact. The specific focus on youth athletes this season was an example of that, evidenced by the success rate of YOG qualifying. However, the sliding experience of many of the qualified athletes was very low, due partly to their young age, but also due to a lack of experience in the months and years leading up to YOG. In the future, athletes in the FIL Groups will be required to participate in more training to gain the experience necessary to perform safely and at a higher level. Available support to NFs, in its various forms, continues to be a concern, and it does not appear that these levels will increase anytime soon. All nations are strongly encouraged to seek out their own funding sources either through sponsorship, government support or other means.

Some initiatives that will be focused on in the coming season include:

- Assist new and development level nations with athlete identification through summer recruitment clinics.
- Encourage and oversee off season physical training of FIL Group athletes to be better prepared physically for the season.
- Continue updating the current supply of FIL equipment.
- Encouraging NFs to be more disciplined with advanced planning.
- Increased participation in the FIL summer camp.
- Work with indigenous winter nations who currently have low participation to increase their involvement.
- Increase fall run volume for FIL Group athletes.
- Assist in creating a development pipeline for nations new to the FIL.
- Standardized coaches training for developing nations.







FIL NB Report: 2023-2024 Season Christina Goetschl, FIL NB Coach

Programs and schedule:

Between the races and official trainings from Dec-Feb the athletes could join nearly 30 training days what is great if you take the warm temperatures into account. The great racing calendar of the season 23/24 made it possible to train a lot and focus on the races because there was less driving and travelling during the season.

USA and CZE are doing a very good youth work - they have a lot of motivated and talented athletes. All athletes are also posting on social media what helps the sport a lot to become more popular. The group was so small this season, but at least the progress of every athlete was amazing, they made big steps forward.

(Some of the athletes also brought their own money from sponsors, which of course supported them a lot during the season. We coaches always tell the athletes that it's important and now step by step its working).

This year's award for the "Rookie of the year" went to Torrey Cookman USA. (The award is presented to an athlete who embodies the FIL Group through good standings, dedication and also through contributions towards the group of athletes as a whole on and off the track.)

#### **Future Goals**

For 24/25 there should be a better communication and networking between FIL and the nations - starting now! It's important that the nations are motivated to send athletes and that we know what benefits they like - to send athletes. FIL tourbus for promotion work in summer must take place, online training with the athletes must be done or at least send some training plans - some of the athletes are so weak it's dangerous. More focus on social media, try to find sponsoring money, stay in contact also in summer with the athletes to keep them motivated. Thinking about a trainer education during FIL school 24/25 - or in summer to get some nations out of the FIL group that they can work self-employed. One of my biggest goals - a training week during summer with an official final race.

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Comments below from: Fred Zimny FIL Development Director

As seen above in the season report by FIL NB Coach Christina Goetschl, the FIL NB Group participated in a full season of training and competition that included 5 participating nations, senior athletes, junior

athletes and WC, JWC, WJM and EM competitions. In particular, the teams from the USA and FRA should be recognized for their commitment to taking part in virtually the entire season, from the beginning of December to mid-February. This commitment to long-term improvement and success should be commended and held up as an example for all athletes wishing to participate in the future. While the group in general was smaller in size than in past years, it's hoped that this trend will reverse itself for the 2024-2025 season. The athletes were in the expert hands of experienced FIL NB Coach Christina Goetschl, and this season, for the first time, joined by Assistant Coach Jack Leslie from NZL.

It was noted this season that many athletes were not necessarily prepared physically to compete to the best of their ability at this, the highest level of the sport. Efforts will be made moving forward to ensure that all athletes in both KB and NB are focusing on physical training during the off season to be better equipped physically for peak performance during the winter season.

With the "Slide 2026" directive from the FIL Executive Board, it's possible that the focus of natural track will undergo some changes in the near future as the sport evolves. Future plans will be under the direction of Andreas Castiglioni, Sport and Technical Director of Natural Track Luge and Public Sledding and Mr. Sorin Buta, Vice President of Natural Track and Public Sledding.

Until the election of a new athletes' representative their predecessor will remain in office.

If an athletes' representative has lost their status as an active athlete, they may still serve on the commission. In the situation that there are more than two non-active athletes If an athletes' representative resigns, there will be a new election of an athletes' representative determined by the FIL Athletes Commission that will be held at the next opportunity but limited to World Cup competitions or World Championships according to 4.12.4. The new athlete representative to be elected must be of the same gender as the athlete representative who has resigned. Until the election of a new athletes' representative their predecessor will remain in office.

## Reason:

The premature resignation of an athletes' representative before the end of their term of office means that the position of athletes' representative is vacant for a certain period of time. This represents a challenge for the Commission, weakens its ability to work and places an additional burden on the remaining representatives.

6.7.1 Eligibility to participate

Maximum two Mixed Teams per nation / per discipline may participate in the competition Respectively (1 Men's Single / 1 Women's Single) and (1 Men's Double / 1 Women's Double) Athletes participating in the Mixed Sinlges / Mixed Doubles competition must be qualified for the WC / NC or for the FIL World Championships.

International teams are possible. The nation-bound composition of the mixed team must be reported to the Sports Director at the first team captains meeting of the respective world cup week.

Two nations which are not able to form their own national team may come together to form an combined international team.

A nation who can form a Mixed Singles / Mixed Doubles team cannot participate in a combined international team in the respective discipline.

No additional starters are allowed in the Mixed Singles / Doubles competition.

### 6.7.2 Registration/entries

- The day before the Mixed Singles / Doubles competition, all NFs participating have to register their teams by name in writing at the latest by 5:00 p.m. or at most 10 minutes after the last competition of the day is completed, whichever comes later.
- After the registration deadline, a substitution is possible for justified reason, e.g. injury or illness or an important reason for the prevention exists.
- Athletes who complete their competition on the same day of the Mixed Singles / Mixed Doubles
  competition must be registered in writing with the Sport Director at most 10 minutes after their
  competition ends.

#### 6.7.3 Start order World Cup / World Championships

The results in the respective disciplines in the respective World Cup / World Championships races will be used to form the rankings. The reverse order of these rankings will be used to determine the start order.

### 6.7.4 Competition procedure

- The second sled may start as soon as the gate opens.

- As soon as the second starter reaches the touch pad, the time stops and the overall time for the mixed team is determined.
- For the first and the second starter a split time is kept in which the reaction time is registered.
- If an athlete does not trigger the touch pad with their hand, that Mixed Team is disqualified.

#### Start area:

- Coaches are not allowed within the start area.
- Walkie talkies or cell phones which assist athletes are forbidden in the immediate start area
- Except for the start leader and the responsible FIL official/judge no other person is allowed in the start area.

#### False start:

- A start line is located at the start in an area 300mm 500mm measuring from the start of the start handles
- A false start occurs if the athlete crossed the marked line prior to the green light
- If an athlete touches the start gate with their foot or runner or causes the start gate to open before the gate is opened, he causes a false start.
- The FIL official/judge who watches and supervises the start process will take note of a false start as the first authority and report it to the race director.
- The start process may be supervised with the help of a video unit. In case of a dispute or a
  protest, the video will be evaluated in order to identify a false start.
- A false start will result in the disqualification of the Mixed Singles / Mixed Doubles team
- The team will complete the race regardless if a false start is called.

- b) The advertising surface on the front of helmets may only be used by the FIL (70 sq cm).
- c) If the FIL transfers this advertising surface to the National Federations, the branch exclusivity of the FIL main sponsors has to be respected.
- d) It is permitted to wear a national emblem on the helmet (max. 30 sq cm) and also the name of the athlete (maximum twice, height of the writing maximum each 15 mm) at the back of the helmet without obstructing the official FIL advertising.

#### 2.3 Visor

- -Visor straps have to conform to commercially available products.
- -The width of the visor strap is limited to 4 cm.

#### 2.4 Caps, Headbands, and other Headgear




Figure: :example of advertsing on the helmet







Figure: example for advertising on gloves

For the luge competitions during Youth Olympic Winter Games (YOG), the stipulations of the International Luge Regulations (IRO) are valid.

The following additional rules are valid for the YOG:

◆ Team Relay: 1

### 1.2 Draw, Start Order

The seeded groups for the individual disciplines are determined on the basis of the Youth A World Cup point standings of the Olympic season as of December 31, according to national federations. Each national federation can nominate its qualified athletes according to the national rankings.

### 1.4 Education of International Judges

The Organizing Committee (OC) of the Youth Olympic Winter Games is responsible for the education of the judges appointed for the YOG and has to take care of the respective expenses. If necessary, the OC may appoint experienced external judges.

### 1.5 Advertising Regulations

The regulations of the IOC are valid.

### 1.6 Nominations / Entry Fee

According to the regulations of the IOC, the nominations have to be made by the NOC responsible to the OC on the stipulated dates.

The Executive Board of the FIL is to be constantly informed on the nominations by the OC. No entry fee has to be paid.

### 1.7 Inspections at the Finish

At the YOG, the sled drawn will be marked after the 1st run and checked for compliance with § 5 and § 7 after the last run at the end of each competition day.

### 1.8 Withdrawal Due to Injury / Sickness

If, during training, an athlete who is nominated for the participation in the singles discipline withdraws due to injury / sickness, then another athlete who belongs to the Olympic team of the NF of the injured person and has completed the minimum number of training runs can be nominated instead.

# 1.9 Training

The Olympic training is regulated as follows:

- 2 systematic training runs per discipline (if no ITW takes place directly before the YOG)
- at least 6 training runs per discipline over 2 days

Training groups of NFs may be established by the FIL and the OC from the local organizer to standardize the group size.

- 1<sup>st</sup> training day, training by discipline of NFs according to draw (by the jury)
- 2<sup>nd</sup> training day, training by discipline in reverse order of NFs

• 3<sup>rd</sup> training day, training by discipline of NFs according to draw (by the jury)

Training groups, (all nations are drawn individually).

- training run, first to last by NF
- track maintenance,
- training run, last to first by NF
- Doubles athletes who participate in singles training cannot participate in singles training assigned to doubles athletes. They receive no systematic run in doubles.
  - In case only one athlete from a doubles team participates in singles training, the doubles team can take the systematic run in doubles.
- If a time difference of two (2) or more days exists between the last training and the first race runs of any discipline, then at least one (1) additional training run must be offered for the athletes participating in the competition. For the team relay competition, this is calculated per discipline.

### 1.10 International Training Courses on the Olympic Track

The event organizers of the Olympic luge competitions are obligated to offer one international training weeks for all NFs in the pre-Olympic or Olympic season. In each of these two weeks, at least 4-5 training days with at least 3 training runs per day must be made available. The same number of training runs must be made available to all NF's.

All NFs must be given the same number of training runs. Canceled training runs must be replaced. During these two international training weeks, the athletes of the host nation do not receive any special rights. The FIL executive board will decide on any training restrictions during the Olympic season.

No additional training runs outside of planned and approved FIL training weeks may be completed on "Olympic" tracks prior to the YOGs with the exception of the organizing nation. All training facilities must be equally available to all nations. Agreements between individual national federations regarding training runs on an "Olympic" track outside of FIL-approved training measures are prohibited if they lead to a violation of the "Fair Play" principle or a disadvantage for other athletes or national federations.

If a violation is detected, the athlete will at least lose his/her place in the seeded group at the Olympic Games and may also be subject to additional sanctions by the FIL executive board.

#### 1.11 Test Race

The track must be available to the FIL 1 year prior to the YOG for testing within the framework of a test competition open to all NFs during the same period as at the Games. The FIL Technical Delegates present at the test race must inspect the track regarding its safety and technical facilities. The OC and the organizing NF must be informed in writing of the results of the inspection during the test race. Complaints have to be fully remedied prior to the staging of the OWG.

### 2. Preparation and Staging

### 2.1 The FIL as Highest Body

The FIL is responsible to the IOC for the proper staging of luge competitions.

The FIL is the highest body of these competitions. In order to meet this task, the FIL appoints and sends the following persons at the expense of the OC during the staging of the Olympic luge program:

- the President and the Secretary General (they officially represent the FIL),
- the jury, consisting of the chairperson and two members,
- the technical delegates, consisting of three persons,
- additional international judges

(the number is coordinated between the IOC, the OC, and the FIL)

• two IOC technical delegates who have to provide the permanent contact to the IOC.

For the jury, technical delegates, and IOC technical delegates, walkie-talkies with independent frequencies have to be provided.

### 2.2 Responsibility of the National Federation

The National Federation in cooperation with the OC of the YOG is responsible for the organization of the Olympic luge competitions.

A permanent and close cooperation between the National Federation, OC and the FIL starting with the preparation work until the completion of the Olympic luge competitions is necessary.

The OC must set up a sports office/department for the luge competitions and appoint a full-time director. The responsible NF must be represented by its President or by another approved appointee with FIL confirmation in a leading position.

### 2.3 Officials, Judges, Assistants

Each NF hosting Olympic luge competitions should have approximately 15 international judges who should already be working during the pre-Olympic test.

The FIL supports the required education and training. Judges who have important tasks during the YOG (race leader, start and finish leaders, chief of track and their representatives) should gain experience already prior to the YOG during important FIL competitions.

The FIL reserves the right to name and approve key leadership positions such as race director, assistant race director(s), ice experts.

The following officials / judges / assistants are required for the Olympic luge competitions:

- organizing chairperson
- press chief
- race director
- assistant race director
- start leader

### 2.4 **Program / Time Schedule**

Taking into account the overall planning of the YOG, the organizers (OC and NF) will propose the detailed Olympic luge program to the FIL on time.

The program schedule is subject to the approval of the FIL executive board. Changes determined by the FIL executive board are binding for the organizers (OC).

### 2.5 Interpreters

A sufficient number of interpreters fluent in German and English have to be available for the officials.

#### 3. <u>Luge Tracks</u>

In general, Olympic luge competitions are staged on combined bobsleigh, luge and skeleton tracks with artificial refrigeration.

The "Regulation for Artificial Luge Tracks" (Supplement 1) is valid.

#### 4. Eligibility Rules

For admission to the Olympic Winter Games, the current qualification criteria agreed between the FIL and the IOC apply. In individual and justified cases, the FIL Executive Board can make exceptions.



# FIL Executive Board Resolution 23.09.2022

The FIL Executive Board decides on the basis of paragraph 4.5.8 of the FIL Statutes:

In view of the war of aggression currently being waged by the Russian Federation against Ukraine, the suspension of all rights to participation of athletes, assistants, coaches, and other officials of the Russian Luge Federation in FIL-sanctioned competitions is ordered until further notice in order to ensure safe, peaceful, and upright athletic competitions.

The presence of Russian athletes, assistants, coaches, and other officials from the Russian Luge Federation during the staging of FIL-sanctioned sport competitions is associated with the high risk that the safety, peacefulness and integrity of these competitions and their participants (including those of the Russian Federation itself) are gravely endangered. This risk is based on the causal personal involvement of the named persons in these FIL competitions and cannot be replaced by a less drastic measure, so that the suspension of participation is proportionate if and as long as the hostilities in Ukraine continue as a reason for this measure.

# To the 72<sup>nd</sup> FIL Congress 2024 in Lake Placid/USA

#### **AUDIT REPORT of 4 May 2024**

We, the undersigned, members of the Control Commission, in accordance with our mandate and in the period 3 and 4 May 2024, in FIL office in Berchtesgaden/GER, examined the accounts, the annual financial statement for 31 March 2024 and all transactions for the business year 2023/2024.

#### We find that:

- 1. The accounts were correctly kept in accordance with the legal requirements,
- 2. All documentary evidence and bank statements are available and agree with the account entries.
- 3. We have checked the assets and liabilities as of 31 March 2024 for any impairment and established that they were correct on that date.
- 4. The annual statement of accounts for the year ended 31 March 2024 and the statement of assets at 31 March 2024 are in agreement with the figures in the accounting records.

The annual statement of accounts for the year ended 31 March 2024 shows:

Net outlay of resources	EUR	4,772,936
Expenditure	EUR	7,142,586
Revenue	EUR	2,369,650

The 2023/24 financial year hasn't been easy for the FIL. Inflation has increased the FIL's operating costs beyond what was budgeted for and the implementation of Slide 2026 along with the FIL's changing sport environment has resulted in unbudgeted expenditure.

The FIL's financial management also had challenges during the 2023/24 financial year. During the year it became apparent that the bookkeeper employed in June 2022 could not provide what was expected and resigned leaving the bookkeeping in disarray. While a decision was made to engage BDO Salzburg to undertake the bookkeeping this was very much in transition at year end.

During the year the Presidium made several important financial management decisions:

- A limited liability company was established for transacting the FIL's commercial activities and events.
- A review of the FIL's banking arrangements is being undertaken to ensure that the FIL's banking
  processes are efficient, including integrating with the FIL's bookkeeping system, cost effective
  and that the return on FIL's investments are being maximized within the parameters the
  Presidium and LGT believe are appropriate.
- Starting next year with the 2024/25 financial year, the FIL will produce a full set of audited financial statements (i.e. balance sheet, income statement and notes), the financial statements will be prepared by BDO Salzburg and audited by ANA Vienna. For the 2034/24 financial year ANA will undertake agreed-upon procedures concerning the statement of assets and liabilities as has been done in the past by SOT.

We commend the Presidium for these initiatives.

While the financial management in the financial year 2023/2024 corresponded closely to budget for many budget items, significant deviations noted are:

- Return on investments €103,000 over budget
- IOC subsidies €246,000 over budget
- Miscellaneous income €40,000 over budget
- Official function expenses for the Presidium €94,000 over budget \*
- Bookkeeping, accounting, audit & tax €48,000 over budget
- Travel expenses for Executive Board Members & Officials €24,000 over budget
- Marketing and Public relations €208,000 over budget
- Athlete's subsidies Continental Cup AT €75,000 over budget
- Doping tests €65,000 under budget
- Development Program AT €91,000 over budget
- Strategy Plan SLIDE 2026 €105,000 over budget \*
- TV incl. agent, production, live streaming & FIL Studio €169,000 over budget
- Expenses for the 2022/23 season (of €74,000) €44,000 over budget
- \* Budget for this expenditure was approved by the Executive Board in September 2023.

Some variances in individual cost center areas are allocation-related and have no significant impact on the overall budget targets. Details of the financial statements as of 31 March 2024 and these variances will be explained verbally at the Congress as usual.

#### Comments on the audit

We find that, beyond the business transactions already discussed, there are no noteworthy changes relative to the financial report for 2023/2024 to be discussed.

Dear Delegates, we find that in the year 2023/2024 our FIL Vice-President for Finance, Geoff Balme, has managed the FIL's assets professionally, prudently and, together with the FIL Presidium, with the usual commitment and success for the benefit of the entire FIL family.

All documents required for our audit were made available for our work freely, in full and collated.

We find that the collaboration between the FIL office in Berchtesgaden and the Vice President for Finance works well.

We would like to thank our staff in the FIL Office, headed by Executive Director Christoph Schweiger and his staff members for the excellent work they have done throughout the year and especially since the departure of the bookkeeper. We would also like to thank BDO and ANA for their professional work, support and guidance.

For the year now ended, 2023/2024, it is therefore our earnest wish to thank the FIL Presidium with President Einars Fogelis at its head, and especially the Vice-President for Finance Geoff Balme, the whole Executive, the commissions and all officials and employees of the FIL for their outstanding and untiring work for the worldwide sport of luge.

Based on the audit that we have carried out, we recommend that the Congress thank the Vice President for Finance Geoff Balme, the Presidium of the FIL, the whole Executive Board and the Control Commission, and releases them from their accounting obligations.





### TV Exposure 2023/24: Air Time by Event (Hours)





### TV Exposure 2023/24 - Compared to previous season: Air Time by Event (Hours)





### TV Exposure 2023/24: Audience by Event (000)





### TV Exposure 2023/24 - Compared to previous season: Audience by Event (000)




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### TV Exposure 2023/24: Air Time by TV (Hours)



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



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

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
### TV Exposure 2023/24: Air Time by Territory (Hours)

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
### TV Exposure 2023/24 - Compared to previous season: Air Time by Territory (Hours)

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### TV Exposure 2023/24: Audience by Territory (000)




